

Phil Akashi Honors Nelson Mandela's Birthday With Symbolic Mural (PHOTOS)



Shanghai-based <u>Phil Akashi</u> artist has a special gift for Nelson Mandela's 95th birthday, a monumental portrait made from 27,000 boxing punches.

The artist attached a seal embedded with the Chinese characters "自由" (meaning "freedom") to a boxing glove, and imprinted Mandela's face into a mural with 27,000 punches.




The seal, dipped in black Cinnabar paste, was chosen to honor Mandela's struggle against the apartheid.

"This artwork exemplifies Nelson Mandela's 27 years of incarceration, but also symbolize his lifelong brave stand for freedom and equality. He sacrificed his own freedom to fight for the freedom of others, and therefore represents a fantastic source of inspiration for the entire world," <u>Akashi says on his website</u>.

This symbolic and powerful mural now resides in the Shanghai Graffiti Park. Mandela was not only a worldwide symbol of peace, but also an extraordinary artist. Pulling inspiration from his painful 27 years behind bars and several visits to the prison on Robben Island, Mandela began a series of 20 drawings reflecting his personal struggle and triumph over apartheid.



Art and boxing don't often intersect. But Belgian-born Shanghai-based artist Phil Akashi married these two subjects when he created a stunning tribute to Nelson Mandela—using boxing gloves and traditional Chinese ink paste. By punching a wall 27,000 times with the characters 自由/"Freedom," the artist produced this homage to Mandela, who remains hospitalized in critical condition.

3. Shanghai: "Tribute to Mandela" by Phil Akashi

In the Shanghai Graffiti Park (No. 709 Lingshi Road, inside the Electric Industrial Park), Belgian-born Shanghai-based artist Phil Akashi has created a mural of Nelson Mandela using a boxing glove to which he attached a seal engraved with the Chinese characters for "freedom." After dipping the glove in black cinnabar paste, Akashi punched the wall 27,000 times to print a monumental portrait, calle "Tribute to Mandela." Inspired by Mandela's lifelong stand for freedom and equality, Akashi's seal painting can be considered a way to promote democracy

through art in politically restrictive China.
